What is the NHS?

The National Health Service (NHS) was founded in 1948 by Aneurin Bevan who was the Minister of Health at that time. He strongly believed that everyone was entitled to free health care from birth to death; that it was a right rather than something people had to pay for.

It was the first time anywhere in the world that completely free healthcare was made available on the basis of citizenship rather than the payment of fees or insurance.



- The NHS is the largest employer in the UK and the biggest group in the workforce are nurses.
- NHS staff on the whole are in contact with more than 1.5 million patients and their families every single day.
- The NHS employs people from over 200 different countries and women make up 77% of the NHS total workforce.
- The London 2012 Olympic opening ceremony featured a tribute to the NHS and all performers in the act came from the NHS and local schools.

Thank you to the paid staff and volunteers of the NHS for all your hard work and dedication to the health of our nation.


